Instructions

Mid-America recognizes the financial pressures of full-time seminary study and does all it can to make such study as affordable as possible. Tuition covers only a small portion of Mid-America's cost of operation. The largest portion is covered by the sacrificial giving of many of God's people. Thus, all students receive a significant amount of financial aid in the form of tuition that is deliberately less than the actual cost of their education. Therefore, we expect students to do some of their own work in raising funds from churches, family, and other outside sources. We also expect students to utilize their own savings and investments. When possible, student spouses should seek employment.

Instructions for Financial Aid

- 1. Fill out the Financial Worksheet using your projected financial situation for next year. Use the completed form and the attached letter to speak with your diaconate about your finances. Your deacons should help you budget if you need help. The Seminary can help estimate cost of living for those who are coming from out of the area. Please do this promptly so your church can include this in its budgeting process.
- 2. Fill out the Financial Aid Application.
 - a. Forms will not be processed until you have been admitted.
 - b. The application deadline is May 1. Any applications received after that date will be considered at a reduced rate based on the availability of funds.
 - c. Aid is awarded for one academic year at a time. The financial aid committee reserves the right to reevaluate aid should your financial situation, degree program, or intended course load substantially change.
 - d. Priority for aid is given to full-time M.Div. students.
 - e. Mid-America offers three types of financial assistance
 - Workstudy on campus employment in areas such as security and housekeeping. Applications for workstudy can be filled out at registration.
 - Scholarships awards are based on high academic standing and other criteria as specified. These awards are made in the summer.
 - Grants awards are based on financial need. These awards can be applied to tuition or in some cases given directly to the student to help with living expenses.
- Turn in the Financial Aid Application and a signed copy of the Financial Worksheet.

Note that the **scholarship application** is part of the financial aid application. If you would like to be considered for scholarships, but are not requesting a grant, please note that on the form. To be eligible for a scholarship based on financial need, you must fill out all the financial information and outside assistance information.

Financial aid awarded by Mid-America is confidential between the student and the Student Aid Committee. Aid may be discussed with your council or session, but should not be discussed with other students. Any such discussion with students could result in the forfeiture of financial aid.

All sources of support must be shown in U.S. dollars. Certification of funding must be submitted in English. All letters of support must be for Mid-America and not some other institution. If the Seminary finds your application for admission, financial aid application and other documentation complete, we will issue you an I-20, which you must bring with you to the U.S. Consulate.

To the Diaconate,

A student from your church is applying for financial aid from Mid-America Reformed Seminary. In order to be eligible for financial assistance from the Student Aid Fund, students must first seek financial aid from their local churches, and, if necessary, from the regional church.

Mid-America recognizes the financial pressures of full-time seminary study and does all it can to make it as affordable as possible. Tuition covers only a small portion of Mid-America's cost of operation. The largest portion is covered by the sacrificial giving of many of God's people. Thus, all students receive a significant amount of financial aid in the form of tuition that is deliberately less than the actual cost of their education. A limited amount of additional financial aid is available through our Student Aid Fund to assist students who demonstrate financial need.

The vocational calling of a minister of the Word is unique compared to that of, for example, an accountant. The calling of a minister is observed and confirmed by the church, and it is the church that oversees and shepherds the student in his preparation for gospel ministry. The seminary serves as a resource for the church to help the student in his preparation for the ministry (i.e. we do not take the place of the church). Since ministerial preparation is a function of the church, the church has primary responsibility for ensuring the student's welfare while he prepares for the gospel call.

Mid-America's Student Aid Fund is intended to help "bridge the gap" between what resources the church and the student are able to provide and the cost of preparation for the gospel ministry. The Student Aid Fund has been endowed over many years by the faithful giving of God's people who are devoted to seeing students prepared to propagate steadfastly the gospel of Jesus Christ. The Student Aid Fund has limited resources to allocate to students with financial need and should be considered the final source of financial aid.

To assist you in understanding the student's financial needs we have provided a budgeting worksheet that the student should fill out and review with you. In meeting with the student, you may want to address some of the following:

- How money will be provided (for tuition, for living expenses, etc.).
- How often money will be distributed (per semester, monthly, etc.).
- How the student will be held accountable (budget submission, regular meetings, etc.).

Please be sure to sign off on the budgeting worksheet as the student will submit a copy with his financial aid application.
